Survive tsunami

Preparation is the key for those living or visiting the area of New Zealand most at risk from a local or distant source tsunami. The East Coast is in a vulnerable position for such a natural disaster, but Wairoa District Council Emergency Management Officer Tim Allan said there is plenty people can do to prepare themselves should a tsunami strike. 'One of the most important steps to take is to have an evacuation plan in place for yourself and your family. It could be that you only have a few minutes to react, so everyone needs to know exactly what to do," he said.

With this in mind, Mr Allan has been working with Hawkes Bay Regional Council computer modelling to develop detailed evacuation plans for coastal communities within the

Key risk areas are generally well known, but the modelling provides greater detail to see how tsunami of various heights and strengths could impact both coastal and inshore areas.

Once the plans are complete, they will be distributed within the relevant communities to ensure that everyone knows the quickest route to safety.

While distant source tsunamis allow time for official warnings, natural warning signals are of key importance in response to local source For more information about tsunami, visit tsunami. The first wave may arrive within

When experiencing any of the following signs, go immediately to high ground or as far inland as possible.

Natural Tsunami Warnings

- A strong earthquake that makes it hard to stand up, or a weak, rolling earthquake that lasts a minute or more.
- A sudden rise or fall in sea level.
- Loud and unusual noises from

Move immediately to the nearest high ground, or as far inland as you can.

Do not wait for an official warning. Instead, let the natural signs be your warning and take action.

Once evacuated, listen to a radio station for information from local Civil Defence about any further action required. Wait for the official all clear before returning. Radio frequencies to tune into are:

Festive season sa

Creating a safe and happy holiday environment for the Wairoa District is the responsibility of the whole community. To help achieve this aim Council would like to take this opportunity to remind everyone of a health and safety that often come under pressure during the summer

Compliance officers will be out and about throughout the holidays to offer assistance where required.

A restricted fire season is in place for the area east of SH2 from Nuhaka and Morere, including the entire Mahia Peninsula, which means no open fires are to be lit in that area without a permit. This includes everything from barbeques and hangis, to large burn-offs. There is places.
no cost attached to getting a permit Farmers are reminded that in the permit, so plan ahead. Restrictions are expected to be place on the rest

of the Wairoa Rural Fire District early in the New Year. In the meantime, people are advised to exercise extreme caution when lighting fires due to the increasingly dry conditions.

Animals – pets and stock

Water

Households relying on tank water need to be vigilant about avoiding contaminated water in the summer months. A simple way to ensure water is clean is to add a small quantity of Janola (common household bleach) to destroy harmful bacteria. The following quantities are recommended:

Tank Size	Quantity of Bleach
1,000 litre	60ml
5,000 litre	330ml
10,000 litre	660ml
20.00 litre	1330ml

This form of chlorine treatment is unlikely to kill Giardia and oridium, which require a filter capable of filtering down to 1 micron. Boiling water for 10 minutes will kill all harmful micro-organisms.
