BUSY SEASON FOR THE WAIROA VOLUNTEER FIRE BRIGADE

You might have heard the Wairoa fire siren quite a lot over the last few weeks. The siren alerts the volunteers of the Wairoa Fire Brigade to callouts and this usually happens any time of the day or night.

Sometimes the siren can be heard multiple times over a short period, alerting the volunteers again as more resources are required for a callout.

But what does it mean to be a volunteer firefighter? Wairoa District Council staff member, Katharina Di Lena, shares with us her experience of being a volunteer firefighter.



"Firstly it means to be ready at any time, to drop everything and rush off to the fire station when there is a callout. It means giving up time that you could be spending with your family or friends in order to save and/or protect others in our community."


"But it's also something to be proud of and a good way to give back to the community. You work in a very trusting team environment at callouts and trainings and make friends for life."

"The Wairoa Volunteer Fire Brigade doesn't only put out fires, it also goes to motor vehicle accidents and supports other emergency services like The St Johns Ambulance." "The recent big fire at Mahanga has shown us how important it is for the community to comply with fire bans and to not light any fires or even use coal fired BBQs."

"Ignoring fire ban messages can be devastating for the whole community and given that the Wairoa district is now in a Total Fire Ban season, it is so important we comply with the fire bans. Fate was on the side of firefighters at the Mahanga fire, and due to a wind change only one house was lost, it could have been so much worse."

"Firefighters worked to contain the Mahanga fire from midafternoon on Sunday 8th January and days later fire crews were still monitoring hotspots to prevent the fire from flaring up again. I was so proud of the team and the work they did."

"Every volunteer firefighter spends about two and a half hours a week on training and Duty Crew. Duty Crews check the fire appliances and its equipment to make sure they are in working order" says Ms Di Lena.



The Wairoa Fire Brigade has 22 volunteer firefighters at the moment. Not every volunteer is available at times due to work and other commitments.

Therefore the Wairoa Volunteer Fire Brigade is in need of new volunteer firefighters. If you are interested in becoming a firefighter contact Grant Duley, the Chief Fire Officer on 027 24 01 153. Join the Fire Brigade on a training night on Mondays at 7pm to find out what it means to be a volunteer fire fighter.
