VISIT FROM MINISTERS

Last week, Cyclone Recovery Minister, the Hon. Grant Robertson and Minister for Emergency Management and Hawke's Bay Cyclone Recovery ministerial lead, the Hon. Kieran McAnulty, visited Wairoa.

This was the first time Mr Robertson had visited us since Cyclone Gabrielle, and he acknowledged the enormous damage our people and our whenua have suffered.

He talked about a locally and regionally-led rebuilding approach supported by the central government.

He acknowledged that Wairoa's geographical location makes it difficult to get things done and that we have specific and unique issues that need to be taken into account.

He also said negotiations are taking place around flood mitigation options and Land Categorisations. While the Hawke's Bay Regional Council has been working with the central government on this, Mr Robertson wants to ensure any developments align with what Wairoa wants. This was reassuring to hear, we need our local entities working together to find a solution for Wairoa.

Currently, Wairoa is 'in limbo' hanging in the 2A category, which is basically the category of uncertainty with significant further assessment required. To move to 2C, or even 1, we need flood mitigation, which will come at a cost.

Mr Robertson assured us that the central government will contribute significantly towards future-proofing Wairoa. None of us want a repeat of Cyclone Bola 35 years ago, where nothing happened.

The four key issues to be able to move forward are confirmation of funding and how that looks, design, securing any necessary land and the regulatory process.

The Ministers also acknowledged the damage our infrastructure has sustained and the untapped potential we have as we rebuild.

Wairoa is a vast area with a low rating base, and there was also discussion around factors like Growth Domestic Product (GDP) that could be taken into account as our district produces more per capita than most.

We will continue to work with the Hawke's Bay Regional Council and Central Government to ensure we find the best future focussed solution for Wairoa. We are not in a position to pay for recovery costs, including flood mitigation.

This week Council adopted its 2023/24 Annual Plan. The key for elected members has been balancing affordability with

Council had initially gone into the Annual Plan engagement process with a proposed 15.4 per cent increase. However, a projected contribution from Council Controlled Trading Organisation (CCTO) QRS has seen the final average increase drop to 10.6 per cent.

We appreciate the success and hard work of QRS in returning a projected higher contribution. It is a real credit to QRS that they have done so well. We have also received tremendous business support in the wake of Cyclone Gabrielle from other local businesses like Affco. Any business that would like to contribute to help Wairoa rebuild and recover, please get in touch with me.

While we have offset some of the increased costs, it does not take away from the fact that rising costs due to supply and demand issues and increasing inflation have put real pressure on the budgets Council forecasted for this year.
